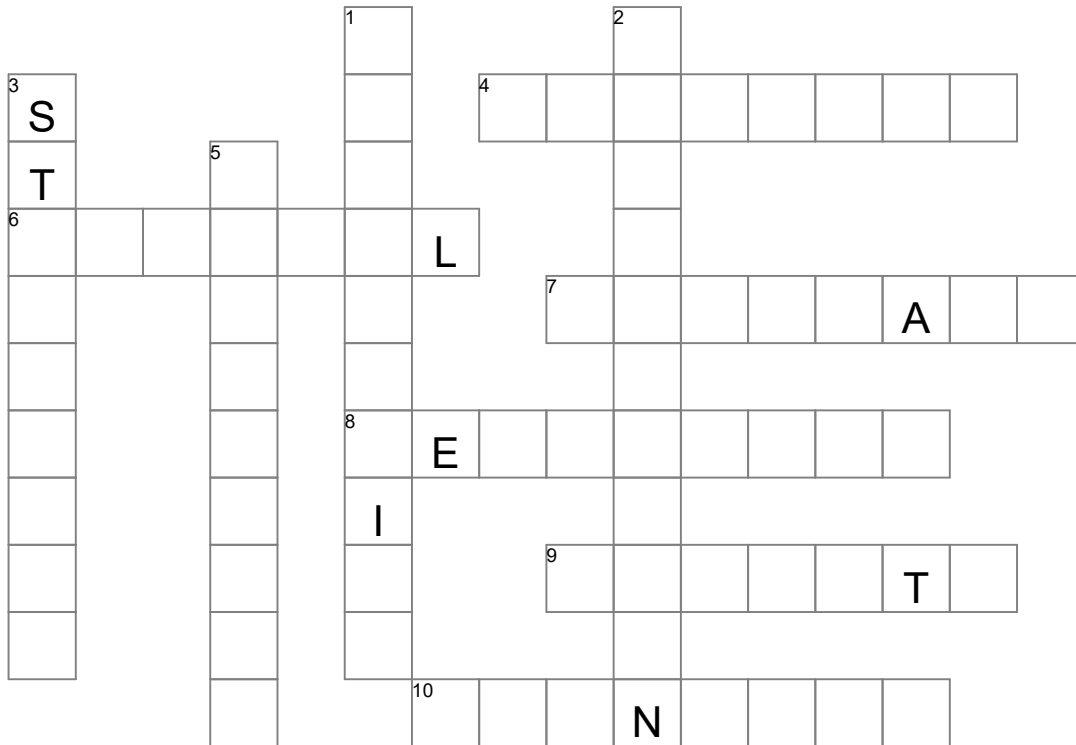

**The 19th Amendmant**

"The right of the citizens of the United States to vote shall not bee denied or abridged by the United States or any State on account of sex." Thes hardly sounds like a **radical** idea. Could anee reasonable person **dispute** the fairness of such a statement? It may be unthinkable now, but less than a hundrd years ago, this **proposition** was the subject of heated discussien.

Even in the 19th century, women had few rigts. Men ran their families end the government. Only men could buy and sell property. If they went to school at all, women wur given only a basic education. The marriage vows required a woman to "love, honor, and obeee" her husband, and the rit to vote was limited to men.

Change was painfully slow, but it finalli came. The **unwavering**

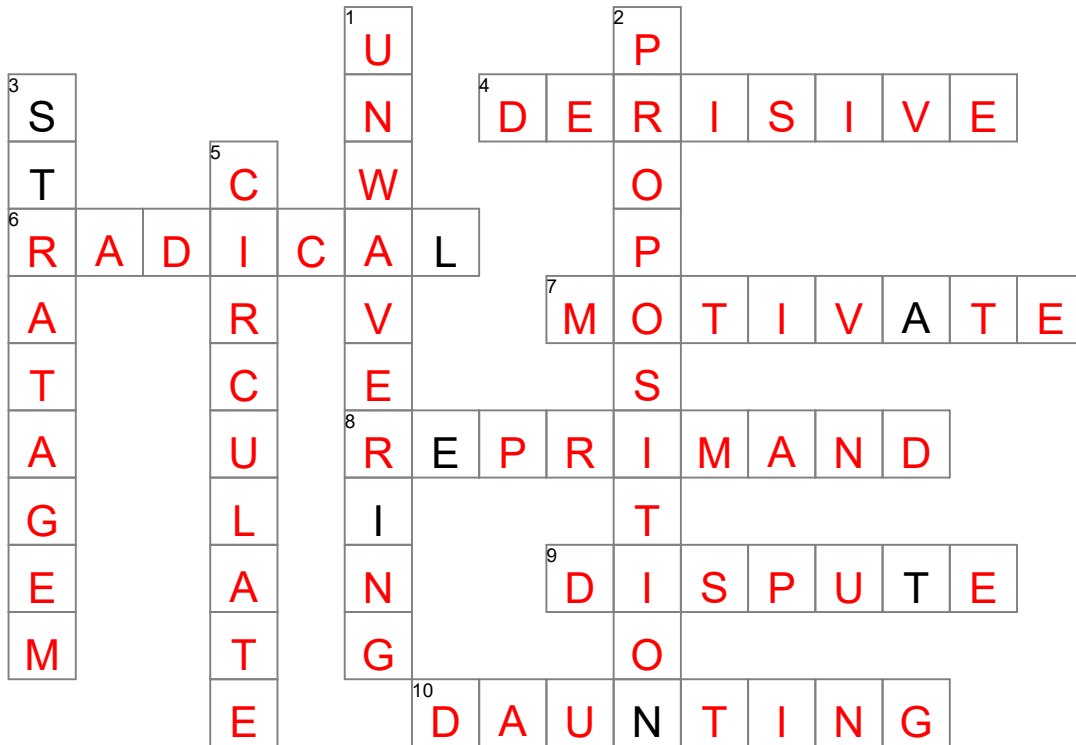

A surprising event occurred after the war. The Wyomng Territory, where men outnumbered women by almost ten to won, granted women the rit to vote. By 1917 sixteen states had granted women the right to vote, but things ceemed to stop there. Such a amendment had been proposed for some 40 years, but it had never passed. In spit of an overwhelming number of petitions, it was defeated again in 1914. Aftar President Wilson gave his support, the amendment was finally passed and sent to the states for approval in 1919. 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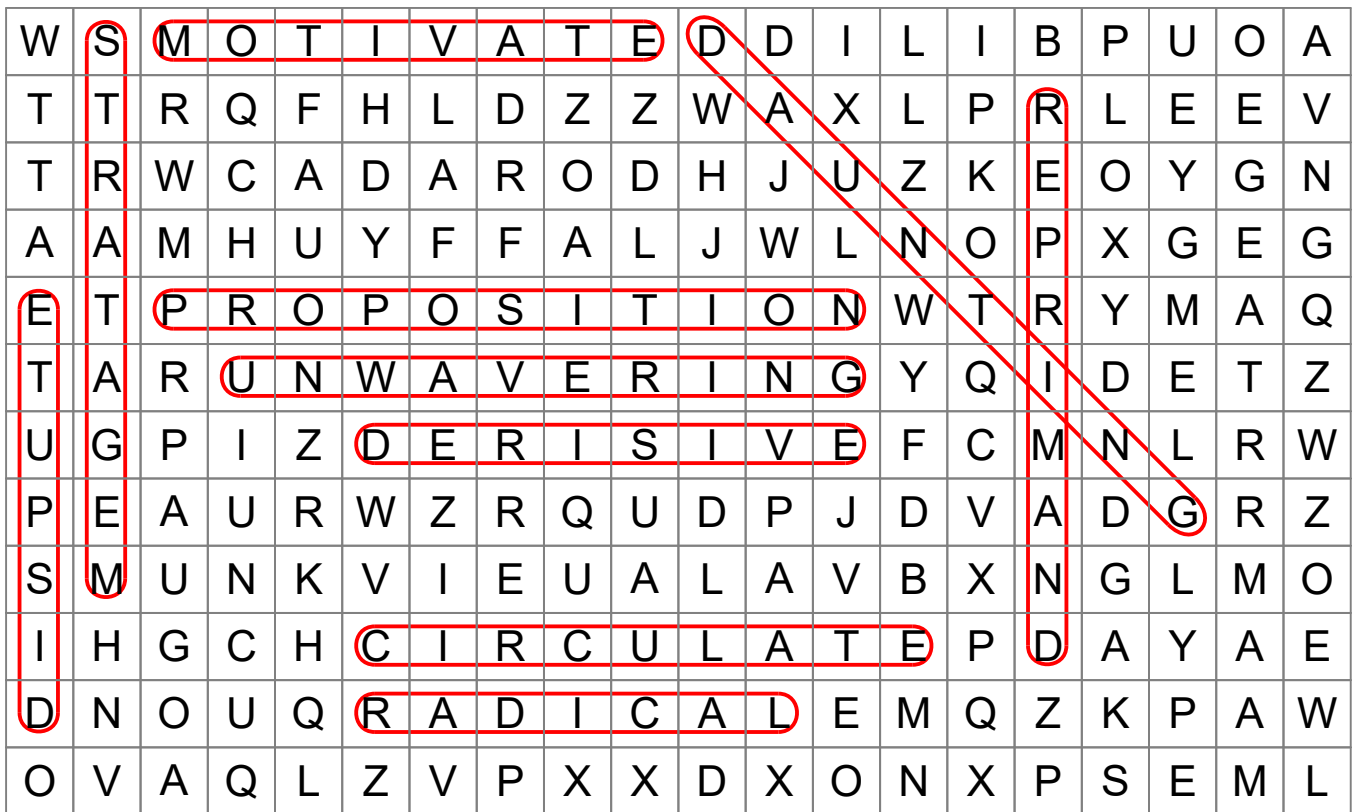
