

- **5.** A person who enjoys eating and often eats too much; also refers to someone with a refined palate, appreciating highquality food.
- **6.** A traditional Scottish dish made from a sheep's stomach stuffed with minced liver, lungs, and heart, combined with oatmeal, onions, and spices.
- 11. Refers to the part of Edinburgh built in the 18th and 19th centuries, distinguished by its planned street layout and elegant Georgian architecture.
- **12.** A designation bestowed by UNESCO to cities that have a strong literary heritage and are committed to fostering literature, reading, and writing.
- **13.** An iconic historic fortress that dominates the skyline of Edinburgh, Scotland. It has played a pivotal role in the country's history, serving variously as a royal palace, military stronghold, and prison.
- **15.** A term for the oldest part of the city, characterized by medieval street plans, narrow alleys, and historic buildings.

- 1. A royal park in central Edinburgh, containing Arthur's Seat and other geological formations that showcase the area's ancient volcanic history.
- **4.** A style of architecture prevalent during the Georgian era, marked by symmetry, proportion, and classical details.
- 7. A traditional Scottish musical instrument consisting of a bag with attached pipes, played by blowing air into the bag and manipulating the pipes to create sound.
- **8.** The main thoroughfare of Edinburgh's Old Town, connecting Edinburgh Castle and the Palace of Holyroodhouse. It is lined with numerous historic buildings and landmarks.
- **9.** Relating to the Middle Ages, a period in European history from the 5th to the late 15th century, characterized by feudalism, the growth of monasticism, and the development of Gothic architecture.
- **10.** The main peak in the group of hills in Edinburgh, formed by an ancient volcano, and is known for its sweeping views of the city.
- **14.** Also known as the High Kirk of Edinburgh, a historic building and prominent place of worship located in the Old Town.
