

- **10.** The variety and variability of life on Earth, including the different species of plants, animals, and microorganisms, the genetic differences within these species, and the ecosystems they form.
- 11. The action of clearing a wide area of trees, often resulting in damage to the quality of the land.
- **13.** The deterioration of the environment through depletion of resources, destruction of ecosystems, and extinction of wildlife.
- **14.** An international treaty within the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change (UNFCCC), dealing with greenhousegasemissions mitigation and adaptation.
- **15.** An economic system aimed at minimizing waste and making the most of resources, by reusing, recycling, and regenerating products and materials.
