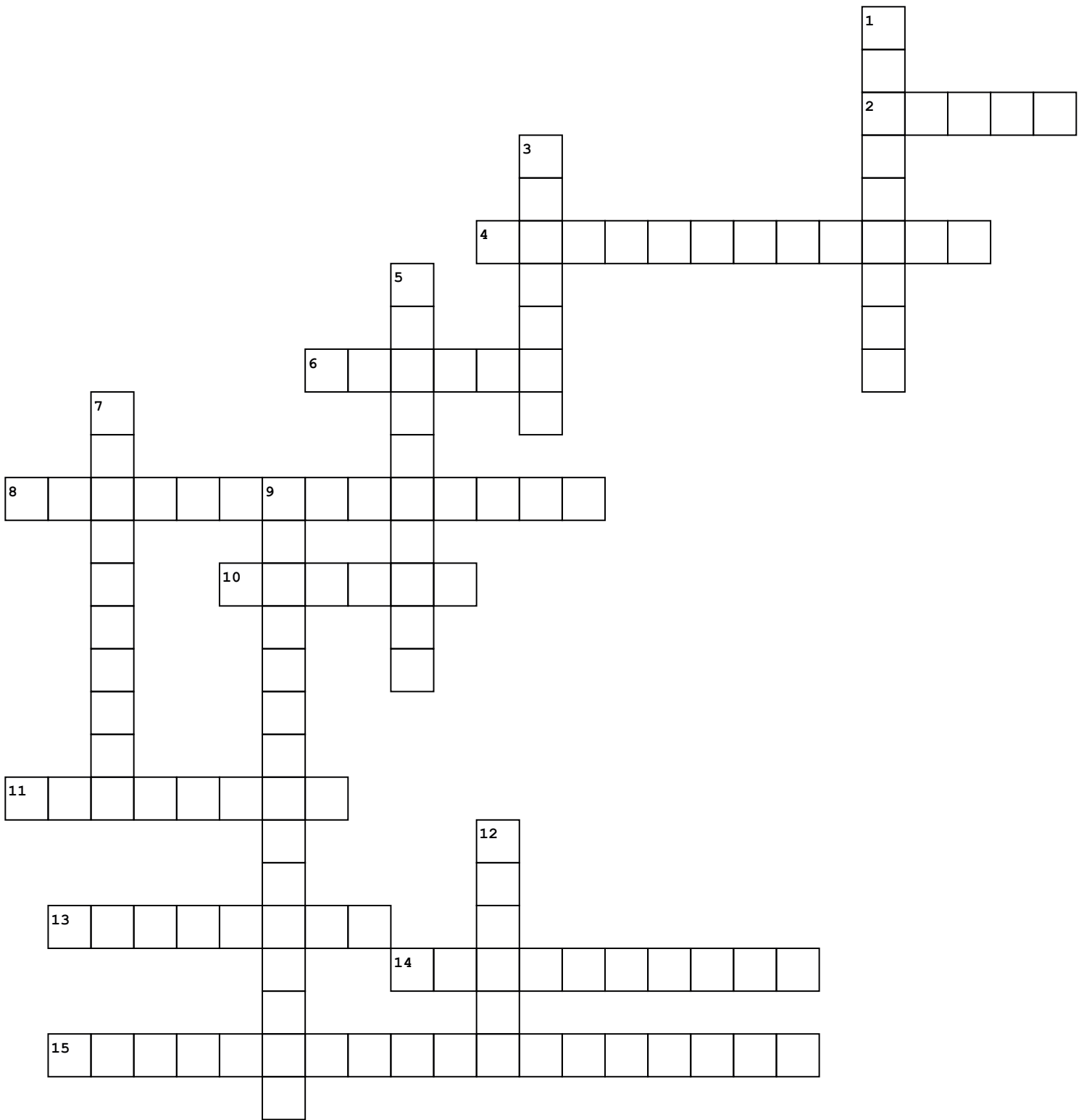


The Mysteries of the Deep Sea
